2013 has been another enjoyable year at Crystal Creek.



Other achievements

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Significant programs and initiatives

Steward House Concert

Crystal Creek students were involved in an annual concert which involves small schools from the Tweed Valley area. The concert was held on the 21st August at Murwillumbah High school in Term 3. Not only did all students sing a variety of songs combined with the other small schools, but our students also performed a Hip-hop routine which was learnt during daily fitness. Congratulations to all Crystal creek students for great effort in rehearsing and preforming the dance with enthusiasm.



Murwillumbah show

In Term 4 Crystal Creek had a collection of the students art work on display at the Murwillumbah Show. This year the theme was 'Winter Wonderland' and with thanks to Miss Jefferies and Mrs Lasker our display looked magnificent. The students have all worked extremely hard during art lessons throughout the year and have been given the experience in a wide range of art skills and techniques.

Les Peterkin

Children from Crystal Creek did extremely well in the Les Peterkin Portrait Competition again this year. This year the theme was 'Expressive representations of a group' in a portrait. Congratulations to Priya Dasi who created a piece on "Me and My Sister", Jaydon Nott "Me and Ryvan" and Kaitlin Roach "The Family", who all had their portraits displayed in folders at the Tweed River Art Gallery.

Art Smart Workshop

In Term 3 Ella Fitzgreiald and Kiana Otery-Wright were asked to attend a 'Art Smat Workshop' at Murwillumbah Primary School. Student quote: "Hi my name is Ella Fitzgerald and in term 3, I participated in an Art Smart visual workshop for 3 days. In that time I produced 2 major pieces (there were some smaller drawings as well). I created a large painting of a snail (the theme was bugs) and an outback farm scene. For the snail I used A3 paper. First I did a sketch then painted it. Second I used some special black gloss paint to do the main outline and also used a fine-tipped pen for smaller detail. I did the same for the farm scene, only it was A4, crayon rather than paint and I didn't use the gloss paint, Ella".

Margaret Olley Art Gallery visit

Children in Years 3/4/5/6 were invited to visit the Murwillumbah Art Gallery to see the Margaret Olley display as part of the Young Art People 2013 Project at Tweed River Art Gallery. There were many different types of art such as; paintings, magazine covers, portraits and Margaret Olley's furniture from her house on display. While at the visit the students had to choose their four favourite art works to draw. Students quote: "It was quite hard because they were so unique in many different ways".

"We had a lot of fun at the art gallery".

Dance/ Hip Hop

This year our school took part in a Hip-hop program that was specifically designed to let kids max out on fun and movements while developing fitness, core strength, flexibility and spatial awareness. All teachers watched the students energy and fitness levels soar as they got into the program during daily fitness once a week for ten weeks. The routine the students learnt throughout the program was tweaked by the teachers and used as our performance at the Stewart House Concert.

Girls Group

On the 24th October 2013 our 4/5/6 Girls Group had a camp out at school. The evening was filled with fun engaging activities. The girls not only had a wonderful time spending quality time with one another which helped assist with social groups, but also were very eager to learn how to cook dinner and breakfast. During the night Mrs Curtis ran a discussion on 'Girls Education' which helped make the girls aware of the changes that will occur on their path to becoming young woman. This program also involved team building, friendship support and leadership opportunities.

Environment Day



On the 5th of June this year the students in 4/5/6 attended an Environment Day at Pottsville. Throughout the day the students participated in a variety of rotated activities, all strengthening the student's understandings of sustainability within our environment. As part of attending the Enviroment Day program, Crystal Creek were asked to be involved in a Scarecrow making Competition. The Tweed Shire Council along with Farmer's Choice Organics Nursery in Murwillumbah organised for all of the local schools to be part of the competition. Costa From Gardening Australia was the Judge. With special thanks to Mrs Lasker and the students at Crystal Creek our scarecrow "SCRAPS" was the winning Scarecrow. For winning the competition we were lucky enough to have lessons with Greg from the organics Nursery, were supplied with the equipment needed for each lesson, a compost bin and an extra special visit from Costa himself at our school. The children had a wonderful time designing and making Scraps and then to be able to tell Costa all about it was a special treat.



Easter Hat Workshop

The Easter Hat Parade was held on the 28th March. A great day was had by all students who participated in the Easter Hat Parade. This year instead of the students and parents making the hats at home, Miss McEwan ran an Easter Hat Workshop. All parents and students were invited to bring along their creative talents and work with the teachers at school with all equipment supplied to make their own individual hats. It was great to see so many imaginative hat creations. Not only was there a parade to show the amount of work involved in making each hat, but there was also a display of egg-cellent egg dioramas in the library.

Crystal Creek Reading Challenge

This Year Crystal Creek held a reading challenge in Term 3. The Challenge aimed to encourage a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in students. It was not a competition but a challenge for each student to read more and to read more widely. The Challenge ran from 12th August to 20th September 2013. Ongoing reading was encouraged. Each student was asked to keep a personal log, where the books read were listed and tallied. On September 20th the winners per class was announced. Congratulations to Joseph Fitzgerald, Sola Antonini, Ben Edwards and Ari Messina for winning awards for Most Books Read, Encouragement and Improved Reading. Throughout the challenge participation prizes were awarded to students who were not necessarily reading the most books, but who consistently strived to improve their own personal reading skills.



Camp Goodenough Excursion

In September 4/5/6, Mr. Davis and Mrs. Curtis headed off to Camp Goodenough for the 4/5/6 annual school excursion. The camp was held over three days, with the activities conducted challenging the children, whilst inspiring and increasing their inner strength and confidence. Our first activity on day 1 saw all of the children working together to provide support, whilst being challenged to conquer the Giant Swing. With spirits high the children were eager for the experience. After being hoisted far into the air and with their adrenalin pumping the children pulled their safety rope and away they went, soaring through the air. The activity proved to be one of the camp favourites. Day 2 arrived and the children were eager to face the days' challenges head on. First up we headed off to the archery

range where, with a bit of patience and guidance the children all learnt to use their bows and pretty soon arrows were flying and targets were being hit. Once completing our archery activity we headed off up into the trees for the High Ropes Course. On arrival we were met by our instructor and donned our harnesses and safety helmets and eagerly awaited the test ahead.



Fears and tears were soon overcome and the children began moving between the trees like Spiderman, weaving, crawling and negotiating the challenges in their path. After successfully completing the High Ropes activity, selfconfidence was running high with the children excited and eagerly awaiting their next activity. After eating a scrumptious lunch we continued on to the Giant's Playground. Once again with our safety gear on we faced one of the biggest challenges of the camp. As the Giant's Playground loomed up in front of us we knew that this challenge was going to be tough one, but in true Crystal Creek spirit everyone pitched in and soon children were scaling, climbing over obstacles, pulling themselves up and displaying great endurance as they reached the pinnacle of the structure and rang the bell. After an exhausting day we wearily headed back to camp for dinner and evening activities. On the morning of Day 3 we headed off to breakfast and then packed our things up. Afterwards we headed off for our last camp activity, the Crate Stack. Fun was had by all as the students put two milk crates side by side and then commenced to form a tower high into the air as they were being supported and suspend by their fellow students. Congratulations go out to the students as they made the camp a memorable experience.

In the morning we were met by a student from the university who was to be our guide for the day. During the day the children were given the opportunity to take part in a range of exciting and hands-on activities Firstly our guide led us into the lecture theatre where we were met by the university teachers. After the orientation we were guided to the Science faculty where we interacted with real, life like baby and adult mannequins, used stethoscopes and learnt about germs. We then went into the Arts faculty and participated in some drama activities. Afterwards we headed back to the lecture theater to be inspired by the scientist, who was using all sorts of gases to fill balloons. Some of us were then invited to put on safety equipment and hold the balloons whilst the scientist used a butane gas flame to pop the balloons. Throughout this experiment the scientist spoke about the effects the gases had when they came into contact with heat. It was amazing and there were some very large explosions! To end our encounter at the university we went into the gymnasium where

we played a game of "Touch Tag" with the Sports Science majors. Lastly we went back to the lecture theatre where our day began and were issued with little hand held devices which we then used to evaluate the day. Mrs. Curtis along with several Year 6 parents accompanied the students on the day and they were delighted to see the children interacting and getting the knowledge instilled that university is open to everyone and that if they wished to further their education it was an option for them in the future

The fabulous performances presented were put together, rehearsed and preformed entirely by the students. Kids in the Kitchen

- → Ensure that all literacy lessons occur from 9am to 11am each day and maths between 11:30am and 12:30pm. Minimize disruptions at this time.
- → Purchase Maths Plus K 6 text books in line with new curriculum for all students
- → Provide staff with appropriate professional development.
- → Increase Literacy Numeracy budget and spending.
- \rightarrow Stock take reading and math resources and purchase required resources.
